Writing – Summer Week 5 – Home Learning

Session 3

In Session 3, you came up with 'food clothes' for the old man or old woman of Tess. These ideas are going to form the basis of your writing in this session. You are going to rewrite the second verse (Stanza) of the poem. This is all about using your imagination and being descriptive, **NOT** trying to make it rhyme! If you can rhyme, you may BUT it is not a requirement of this learning.

- Look at each line of the poem and refer to your ideas table from Session 2 to help you write an alternative line to complete it. The verse you need to focus on is in bold.
- You can use the scaffolded version or you can write from scratch; choosing which items of clothing
 to include and the order. It must still have nine items of clothing just as the original poem
 does.
