This week, you must research your chosen area: find out as much as you can - the more information, the better!


<u>Week 2</u>

This week, you must start thinking about how you can share the information you've found. A good idea would be to create a mind-map, shown below, of all of the ideas you have.




Example: Table of Information

If people wanted to buy new clothes during the Second World War they needed to take their book of clothing coupons with them. The shopkeeper would then cut out the coupons. In 1942 every man, woman and child was allowed 48 coupons a year for new clothes, but if you were aged 14-16 you were allowed 20 extra coupons.

Below is a list of how many coupons were needed for different items of clothing.




Example: Information with Supporting Images

Example: Mindmap with Detailed Information




Examples: Headings with Key Information









Example: Jumbled Information - Puzzles with Answers


